Nancy Sarpola did a wonderful job keeping up with membership and is probably the reason we broke the 100-member level. Melissa Cowen and Becca Smith coordinated safe garden tours during the pandemic. Kathleen Rochester and Gwen Peterkort were our nominations committee. Marge Alig, Nancy Sarpola, and Jennifer Klammer did a great job revising our by-laws. Svetlana Dascaliuc (Chair), Pat Gallagher and Sande Reitmeier-Coolen did a wonderful job on our grants committee on short notice and entertained and considered the largest number of grant applications we have ever received. Kas McGregor did a great job on the newsletter and membership booklet and passed the newsletter to Val Hall in 2021. Trumpetvine was coordinated by Signe Danler until Janet Magedanz took it over this winter. Donna Westwood is still the chair of our Flower Therapy and is anxious to restart once restrictions are lifted. Bekki Levin did a major facelift of our website. If you notice, there are a lot of repeating names in the kudos above; I hope more of you will want to step up to run for office or to volunteer to serve your club. And, my sincere apologies if I forgot anyone...it is a long list.

# **Evening Garden Club Member Meeting Minutes**

April 5, 2021 via Zoom

The evening began with Ruby Moon introducing one of the longtime members of the EGC, Signe Danler, who spoke about *Regenerative Gardening*. Signe Danler is a veteran Master Gardener and landscape designer with particular interest in urban horticulture and applying ecological principles to landscape design and maintenance. As instructor for the OSU Extension Service online Master Gardener Program, she uses her experience and training in gardening, urban forestry and ecological landscaping to communicate about and promote sustainable gardening and landscaping practices.

The business meeting began at 8:05 PM with approval of the March membership meeting minutes by a motion, seconded, passed.

Treasurer's report – Checking account beginning balance \$5,036.28 plus deposit of \$506.80, less disbursements of \$493.50, ending balance \$5,049.58 plus savings of \$7,006.82, total funds available \$12,056.40. Included with the treasurer's report was a count of membership – 103 members, 71 individuals and 16 families.

Budget adjustment: This subject arose because our net revenue for the existing fiscal year is significantly higher than was projected. The recommended change was to increase the grants budget from \$1,000 to \$2,000. After reviewing the preexisting budget with actual numbers as of 4/1/2021, a motion was made, seconded, and passed to increase the grants budget to \$2,000.

Grants Committee Report – Svetlana Dascaliuec, other committee members were Sandra Reitmeier-Coolen and Pat Gallagher. Svetlana reported that the committee received 17 requests totaling \$7,548. In analyzing the requests, the committee used last year's criteria plus an emphasis on inclusivity. Of the 17 applicants the following were recommended for approval by the general membership:

After questions and answers, a motion was MSP to approve payments to these five organizations.

By-Laws Revisions Report – Marge Alig, other committee members were Nancy Sarpola and Jennifer Klammer Marge reviewed the changes that were made to the by-laws and explained that several items have been removed from the by-laws to be included in a Policies and Procedures document to be created at a later date. Before approval of all changes, it was MSP to change some of the wording in Article IV, #2 from "dues apply to full membership through the next calendar year" to "dues apply to full membership through the following calendar year", and the words "Serve at the pleasure of the board" were deleted from Article VI, Section 6, #3 resulting in #3 no longer appearing, and Article VI, Section 1 "Members at large will serve two-year terms" was changed to "Members at large will serve one-year terms". It was MSP to approve the amended by-laws.

Dan reported that the May plant exchange will be held in the parking lot at Shepherd of the Valley Lutheran Church at 2650 NW Highland Drive (where we've been meeting before COVID) on May  $8^{th}$  from 1-3 PM. Face masks and social distancing will be required. More information will be forthcoming.

Raffle prizes – Harriet Plumley and Gayle Parrish will each receive a copy of Loree Bohl's book entitled *Fearless Gardening: Be Bold, Break the Rules, and Grow What You Love.*
