Speaking of life being good, I've got updated information on our July 2023 garden tour in Washington! The dates are July 12 - 16, 2023 and the following is the important information:

Day 1: Drive to Tacoma (with bathroom stops along the way), Seymour Conservatory in Tacoma, ferry to Vashon Island to Seattle, 3 private gardens

Day 2: Bellevue Botanical Garden, 2 private gardens, Center for Urban Horticulture, tram tour of Washington Park Arboretum

Day 3: Ferry to Bainbridge Island, Bloedel Reserve, Heronswood Gardens, 2 private gardens

Day 4: Seattle Spheres, Chihuly Garden and Glass, 2 private gardens, independent time in Seattle

Day 5: 2 private gardens, Pacific Bonsai Museum, Rhododendron Species Botanical Garden, drive home with bathroom stops along the way

We'll be staying at Watertown Hotel in Seattle all four nights. Some of the meals are included in the price. Lois Moss will be our guide during the entire tour so there will always be someone available for questions. Price: \$1,857 in a room shared with another person, \$2,427 in a solo room without a roommate.

I will soon need to have a good head count because, depending on the number, the size of the bus will change. There will be more information coming as we move into 2023 but, for now, this should provide you with what you need to know to determine whether you want to visit fabulous gardens in Washington. Corvallis Evening Garden Club Program Schedule 2022-23



**General Meeting Minutes
October 3, 2022**

The meeting started at 7pm as an in-person only meeting with Janet Magedanz presiding. The meeting was attended by more than 50 people. This was the annual business meeting the club is required to have.

Ruby Moon introduced our speaker, member Nancy Mandel who gave a Power Point show *Exploring Gardens Across America*. In 2014, Nancy and her husband David drove from Philadelphia to Corvallis in a two-person garden tour. She presented photos from gardens that ranged from the small (1.2 acres) to the huge (1,077 acres), from near sea level to 8,200 feet elevation. There were general gardens and those with specific themes (Japanese, alpine, rose, topiary, and Echo, Oregon's National Bloom Award for small towns).

In the business meeting Janet reported that Marge Alig did a review of the club's finances and found everything in order. We have about \$11,000, enough that we can take a one-year break from fundraising. Janet also reported that the club now has 153 members. Several of the club's committees needed additional members and many people volunteered to fill those positions. Those committees were fundraising, nominations, tours, grants, and website monitoring. Nancy Mandel suggested forming an EGC Garden Book Group. Several members indicated an interest. Janet announced the possibility of the club sponsoring a garden tour of Western Washington. She has received a proposal from a woman who arranges such tours.

The cost would be about \$2,000 per person. Thirteen people were interested in taking such a tour. Two raffle prizes of \$10 gift certificates to Shonnard's Nursery were given out. They were won by Linda Hadfield and Pat Gallagher.
