

One Good Turn Deserves Another...

While strolling around downtown Corvallis a few months ago, I was disappointed at what I saw. The once beautiful garden beds were weedy and overgrown. I contacted the Parks Dept to find out what could be done about the situation. Due to understaffing and inadequate allocation of budget dollars, they are unable to keep up with the maintenance these areas require. Did you know that the Parks Dept is responsible for over 2000 acres of park properties!?

I decided I could either complain about it to all my friends – or do something about it.

A proposal to adopt the garden beds at the intersection of Madison and 2nd St was brought to the CEGC Board. If the club would adopt an area, it could be maintained in perpetuity by club members. I was thrilled that the CEGC Board welcomed the idea enthusiastically!

As the beds are on street corners, we decided to name the endeavor The Good Turn Project. The ten beds will need plant removal, pruning, some basic design work and replanting. The Parks Dept will provide mulch, irrigation and debris hauling. The goal is to have the areas renovated this Spring, then transition to maintenance mode during the Summer.



This is where you, our members, come in. We are looking for volunteers who can help with any aspect of the project. You can commit to as little or as much as you like. We will have our first meeting in January to get things moving.

We are hoping this project will be a shining example of the impact citizens can make in their community. It may encourage groups and individuals to adopt other park areas. Through these kinds of efforts, we can enjoy a city we are proud of.
