Member Meeting Minutes February 6, 2023 7:00 Shepherd of the Valley Lutheran Church

Kathleen Rochester made a request for a volunteer co-secretary to serve from June 2023 to May 2025. She stated that Nancy Mandel has agreed to serve a third year through May 2024 and would work with and train the new co-secretary during that year.

Cathy Kerr introduced Emily Carlson, a research assistant and PHD student at OSU. Emily gave an engaging presentation on "Improving Backyard Habitat for Bees". She stated that there are 630 known species of native bees in Oregon. Bees need a suitable place to nest. 70% of Oregon native bees nest in the ground. They also need appropriate pollen sources. Some bees are generalists and can use many types of flowers, others can use any of several native species of flower and others require one specific native flower. One suggestion she made was to use lots of different flower shapes and to use some native plants. She did not cover plant requirements for butterflies but stated that the Flora of Oregon book has an appendix that lists host plants for our native butterflies.

There were 34 Zoom participants and approximately 18 in person participants.
