# **Meet a Member**



**Bea Van Horne** 

Now retired, I feel lucky to be able to create the garden of my dreams on a couple of acres. My working life as a vertebrate ecologist included 17 years as a professor of zoology at Colorado State University, where I conducted research on birds and small mammals, focusing on habitat issues. I also worked for the national offices of the US Forest Service (7 years) and US Geological Survey Biological Research Division (4 years). I moved to Corvallis as a Program Manager for the US Forest Service in 2010. Recent books are People Forests and Change: Lessons from the Pacific Northwest Olson, D. H. and B. Van Horne, eds, 2017 and Shepherding Nature: The Challenge of Conservation Reliance, Scott, J. M., J. A. Wiens, B. Van Horne, and D. D. Goble, 2020.



In my garden I strive to integrate food production for my family with ornamentals. I emphasize native plants or types that are closely related. I don't do much with rare types or varieties, and do not keep indoor plants.

The garden is surrounded by a deer fence that is raised a bit so small animals can go in and out. Each area of the garden has its own feel such as northwest forest meadow, dry ridge, wetland, shady hillside, or open shrubland. I find that gardening in the Pacific Northwest is mostly about removing biomass. I am somewhat nutty about compost and send only the woody stuff out to Republic Service's big grinders. A couple of times a year I douse the ornamentals with compost. I use wood chips as mulch in the outer areas of the garden, and allow favorite plants such as columbine to wander where they will. I suppose 60% of my garden time is spent weeding, 20% pruning, and 20% on growing, harvesting, and storing fruits and vegetables.

It is my hope that the garden will provide habitat for small mammals, arthropods, herpetofauna, and birds throughout the year. Also, that visitors and family will find it attractive and peaceful—a source of enjoyment and relaxation with little reminders of outdoor places they have known and loved.
