I was beginning to think spring would never arrive but the good news is that spring has sprung! I took a quick walkaround in my backyard this morning – squish, squish, squish – and the new plant growth is making up for lost time. Yay!

I will soon send out the Trumpetvine reminder about our upcoming May membership meeting. It's going to be a "twofer". Darren Morgan from Shonnard's Nursery will be speaking to us about tomatoes, how to grow them and which varieties are best for the Willamette Valley. After Darren's presentation we will segue to our plant exchange. This is always a fun event because the range and depth of plant material is remarkable so your "job" is to be potting up whatever annual, perennial, shrub, tree, bulb, rhizome that you would like to share. Please remember to include the name of the plant so we know what we're gazing at.

To make our May event even more fun, if you've got one - or more - garden books that you no longer need, consider bringing it/them along to the May meeting. If you find a new treasure amongst the books, consider dropping a dollar or two into the new Grants Fund container and take home a new garden resource. However, if no one claims your contribution, it WILL go back home with you. At our last membership meeting we decided to accumulate funds for our annual grants awards with member contributions instead of sponsoring one or more fundraising events. Over the year we're hoping to raise \$1,000 from contributions with another \$1,000 from our financial reserves so we can continue to provide benefits to other gardening related nonprofits. So, if you are celebrating a birthday, anniversary, or whatever else, consider writing a check to EGC. Those gifts will be set aside for the grants process. Keep in mind that EGC is a 501(c)(3) organization so the gift will be tax deductible.

At our board meeting this morning, we approved a new project - Homegrown National Park. You'll remember hearing about this endeavor during the Zoom meeting with Doug Tallamy. Several EGC members began planning for how EGC could be a part of this endeavor and the HNP Committee, chaired by Robin Strauss, will be providing more information in the future.

As you know, Trumpetvine is our primary vehicle for communicating about garden related information. The Evening Garden Club announced the winners of the 2023 Grants competition.

The grant program, funded entirely by the fundraising activities of EGC, supports learning, practicing, and appreciation of gardening in our community.



This year, the projects supported by EGC grants include school gardens (Bessie Coleman Elementary School, Philomath Elementary and Middle School, Philomath Montessori, and Ashbrook Independent School), community gardening and beautification projects (DevNW/Thriving Communities, Philomath Community Services).

Corvallis Evening Garden Club is thrilled and honored to support the projects that make our community so special.

Previous Grant Program Highlights:

DevNW was awarded a grant in 2022 from the Corvallis Evening Garden Club to provide gardening resources at two of the community gardens located on our affordable housing properties: Leonard Street Community Gardens and Lancaster Bridge Community Gardens.

The funds were used to purchase soil amendments, seeds, and plant starts for the established plots gardened by the community residents.



The pictures above and below were taken early (above) and late (below) in the 2022 season at the Lancaster Bridge Community Gardens in Northeast Corvallis. The bounty from the 19 garden plots maintained by the residents provides access to fresh vegetables in high-density, resource-poor neighborhoods.



The grant also funded books for the Little Free Library constructed in the Fall of 2022 at the Leonard Street Community Gardens. The LFL construction project was funded, in part, by a grant from the Benton Community Foundation, combining two local funding sources for a beautiful designated site where

neighbors can access reading material, community garden produce, non-perishable donations and monthly newsletters. The books purchased with Evening Garden Club funds are garden resource books for beginner- and youthgardeners.

Member Meeting Minutes April 3, 2023 7:00 Shepherd of the Valley Lutheran Church

The meeting started at 7pm April 3, 2023, as a hybrid meeting with Janet Magedanz presiding. There were 62 inperson attendees and 11 Zoom attendees.

Joyce Eberhardt spoke on Native Plants in Your Garden Through the Seasons. Joyce is a retired, senior faculty research assistant in the Department of Crop and Soil Sciences at OSU. Her presentation of recommended native plants was arranged by season and then by size (tree to groundcover). It is amazing how many beautiful, garden worthy plants are available to us who live in Western Oregon. After Joyce's presentation, members could purchase native plants from Esther McAvoy of Willamette Gardens.

Anna Cassilly and Donna Schultz have volunteered to oversee name tags. We thank them for volunteering and give a big thank you to Catherine Whiting for her two years of service doing this job.

The business meeting had three agenda items: election of officers, approval of grants, and discussion about grant funding. The members elected new officers, who will begin their duties on July 1. The incoming officers are President – Heather Emberson, President elect – Nancy Haldeman, Co- treasurers – Hanne and Heinrich Niederhausen and Paul Westerberg, Co- secretaries – Judi DeBord and Nancy Mandel, Members at Large – Karen Hopson, Gayle Parrish and Patrick Emblidge. Thanks were extended to the Nominating Committee (Kathleen Rochester, Betsy Close and Nancy Haldeman) for a good slate.

The Grants Committee (chaired by Svetlana Dascaliuc, with Sandra Reitmeier-Coolen, Christina Clark, Karen Hopson and Debbie Cornitius) proposed seven grants totaling the budgeted amount of \$2,500 be provided to: Corvallis Neighborhood Housing - \$500, Bessie Coleman Elementary School - \$490, Philomath Middle School - \$150, Ashbrook School - \$500, Philomath Community Service - \$435, Philomath Elementary School - \$250, and Philomath Montessori - \$150. Members approved the grants as proposed.

Because of the difficulty in finding volunteers, the Board is considering funding grants through an increase in dues instead of fundraising events. Presently all the club activities except grants are funded through dues while grants are funded through fundraising and from the club's savings. The Board is suggesting that dues be increased by \$10 per year, resulting in an additional income of approximately \$1,500 which would be devoted to grants. Money from the club's savings would be added to that amount. The club has about \$10,000 in total after distributing this year's grant money. The Board wanted a sense of what the membership thinks. Janet led a lively discussion. Fundraising events require a lot of time and effort and soliciting volunteers for them has been difficult. The Board feels the club should pursue an alternative method of funding grants and the membership agreed. However, members were generally not in favor of a dues increase to fund grants. It was felt that the club should instead seek voluntary donations. This can be done by having a collection basket at in-person events and by asking for donations. The club is a 501c non-profit organization so donations are tax deductible. Members felt the club should try this for one year. Consequently, we will not have a booth at the Spring Garden Festival on May 7, or have fundraising events in the upcoming fiscal year. We will have a collection basket at the May 1 meeting.

The meeting ended with Marge Alig and LeAnna Trosen winning the raffles to Home Grown Gardens.
