

#### Meet a Member Nancy Sarpola

I am a 5<sup>th</sup> generation Oregonian born in the territory of Alaska because my dad joined the Coast Guard. Our family traveled all over the coastal areas of the US and even to Thailand, where I attended the International School of Bangkok. What a surprise to discover that Kathleen Rochester, who is also a member of the Evening Garden Club, attended there a few years after me! Dad retired when I was 15 and we returned to Oregon. I graduated high school in Astoria, where I met my husband, and then went on to OSU.





I have been blessed to garden in Corvallis on a steep quarter acre for 40 years. The first 20 years consisted mainly of raising boys, labrador retrievers and tomatoes while working as a nurse. As the kids grew up and left home, I replaced their basketball hoop with a trellis, the pool with a sitting area and the club house with a flower garden. Some of my paths are paved with 12 x 12' concrete pavers that used to be the floor of the dog kennel. I still grow a few vegetables plus berries (grandkid and labrador retriever favorites!) and dahlias in terraced

vegetable beds but have added many more woody plants, perennials, bulbs, vines, and annuals in the rest of the yard. My other gardening projects include working on the landscape around my church and on my son's yard, where I have opportunities to learn which plants survive neglect and drought!

I became interested in the Evening Garden Club through Spring plant sales and have been a member about 25 years, serving in quite a few capacities. I have always enjoyed swapping stories and plants with the many fascinating people who have joined the club over the years. I also enjoy tours, trips to fun nurseries and programs. Now that I am retired and noticing that it is a bit harder to get up off the ground, I have been trying to cut back on big, vigorous perennials and focus more on easy care shrubs. Simplifying is a two step forward, one step back process as I cannot resist trying new plants even though there is hardly a square inch to spare in my garden. Among my favorites are Spring ephemerals as they require very little space or maintenance. Heading out to the garden every morning to see how the plants are progressing is one of my greatest pleasures.

As I've nurtured these pots the last several months, teachers, students, and parents alike have made wonderful comments as they pass by. They have said that the planters bring joy to the front of the school whether through a smile or a conversation or through simply showing that the community cares about "our" school and wants to make it look nice.

### Ashbrook Independent School 2023 Grant Thank you

Grant Committee Members,

Thank you for giving Ashbrook Independent School a \$500 grant for our summer program! We initially applied to use the funds for Ashbrook's Explore Summer Pioneer (5-8th graders) class, "Project Garden," but that class did not have enough participants to run. Instead, we used the funds in our Young Explorers (Preschool-1<sup>st</sup> grade) and Pathfinders (2<sup>nd</sup>-4<sup>th</sup> grades) 6-week Summer Camp.

The students had so much fun painting and installing bee drinking stations; examining the different pieces and parts of plants and learning how they grow from seed; assembling and painting bird houses for our garden friends; painting stepping stones and protecting young plants; and creating a small worm farm to watch how worms make compost. Each week, between 20-25 students were able to learn more about gardening thanks to your grant.

Thank you for supporting the Ashbrook community and having such a generous spirit when it comes to the students at Ashbrook.

Students created and painted bee watering stations from jars and dishes, and they discussed how bees need water but they can't swim! They took home flat marbles and instructions on how to set up the drinking station in their yard.



Fake flowers were used to discuss how flowers and plants grow from seed to a whole plant.

Students then dissected flowers and examined them under a magnifying glass so they could see the pieces and parts up





The students put together a bird house kit and then painted it. They discussed that birds were an important friend to gardens as they scattered seeds and ate pests that would harm the flowers.



The students learned about stepping stones and how they can help beautify the garden but also help us stroll lightly through gardens so we don't destroy tender plants.

Students learned about the life cycle of a worm and how —by breaking down materials and turning them into compost—worms create soil that is beneficial for gardens.
