Meet a Member Donna Schultz

I am a relatively new member to the EGC family. The wealth of shared gardening knowledge and the generosity and positivity of our members is amazing. My favorite events are the plant and social exchanges and garden tours.

I have always loved digging in the dirt. I grew up in an old stone house (1832) with a very large vegetable garden in Scotland – built on a long strip of feudal land – great for showing off snowdrops along the hedgerows. By the age of ten I had inherited a little alpine rock garden. Visits to my grandmother's country cottage have also stayed with me – I remember an abundance of hollyhocks, delphiniums, poppies, lilies, lavenders and phlox. Many years later I worked my first pea patch in Cardiff, Wales. With help from green neighbors, I grew sunflowers, pumpkins, cape gooseberries and Indian herbs and kept company with a hedgehog or two.





My first job in college was in a plant lab, growing seaweed starts. They still hold a fascination for me. Now I live near Philomath, on an unruly 10 acres of land. The grounds and garden are a work in progress. I am interested in improving access for wildlife and expanding the range of native plants. We have honeybees – but are still trying to improve our stewardship.

I recently acquired a little greenhouse and look forward to experimenting with different seed varieties for a spring start. I'm also thinking of growing Wasabi as the beautiful heart shaped leaves are delicious!

Member Meeting Minutes January 8, 2024 7:00

The meeting started at 7 pm as a Zoom only meeting with Heather Emberson presiding. Heather expressed thanks to Nancy Haldeman and Signe Danler for their assistance with the ZOOM meeting. The meeting was attended by 51 people.

Richie Steffen, the executive director of the Elizabeth Carey Miller Botanical Garden, spoke on *The Beauty of Ferns in the Garden*. The Miller Garden is a former private garden located north of downtown Seattle. Only 500 visitors are allowed each year but there is a virtual tour online. The garden consists of four acres, of which two thirds are shaded, making it ideal for ferns. Richie spoke with enthusiasm about the history and variety of ferns. There were ferns 350 million years ago, before the dinosaurs and there are now about 13,000 species. He provided us with two handouts about ferns and showed us some beautiful photos displaying their great variety. He then answered our many questions. The meeting ended at 8:40.
