
President's Message:

Homegrown National Park

The Homegrown National Park Project held the first volunteer workday with nine students from Oregon State University Society of Scholarly Sistas on Oct 19. Two days later we presented the ideas of Homegrown National Park™ and the demonstration project at Monarch on 4th to the Benton County Master Gardeners. Fifteen people joined online and more than 30 people gathered in-person. Other Master Gardener groups, such as those in Jackson and Washington counties, have already shared Homegrown National Park™ ideas with their communities. It is encouraging to see the momentum. Our gardens can do so much in addition to the beauty, respite, (work!) and food they supply to us. They can sequester more carbon, hold more water in the soil, and provide essential habitat for "the little things that rule the world" E.O. Wilson. For this last function, we can add keystone plants.

Members of the project team have been gathering new plants, and we've recently learned that another Oregon State University Club, Medical Humanities, will help plant Phase 1. We've received funding from the Community Thrift Shop to continue with Phase 2, which is the area around the side entrance to Monarch on 4th, and used by clients who park in the back. Floral Therapy



Four times per month, members of the Floral Therapy group pick up just-spent flowers from our partner, Trader Joes, and bring them to one of our 4 participating assisted living facilities. We help residents on multiple levels by providing this activity:

- Flower arranging is **inclusive** of all ages and abilities any interested person is welcome including the resident, care provider or visiting family and friends.
- It can be achieved **anywhere** whatever a person's mobility level, they can engage in the activity from a seated or standing position, and while using an assistive mobility device.
- Floral Therapy improves motor function we try to encourage residents to make the bouquets
 themselves so they can preserve fine motor skills and muscle memory which supports a sense of
 independence.
- Great for seniors with memory loss it engages the senses, provides cognitive and sensory stimulation, and often triggers fond memories of their gardens from long ago.
- **Boosts mood** and a positive sense of well-being we can all attest to the pleasure we feel when given flowers! The Floral Therapy Project is a joyful, soothing and relaxing activity.

You will benefit from participation as much as the residents do! It's a hands-on loving experience.

Betty Shelley and her husband, Jon, have produced just one 32-gallon can of garbage per year since 2006. She finds waste reduction to be a creative and empowering way to reduce her impact on the planet's climate and resources. She is the founder of Reduce Your Waste Project which offers "Less is More: Getting to One Can of Garbage a Year" classes on reducing resource waste (http://reduceyourwasteproject.com). Betty and Jon were featured in The Oregonian in 2013 as well as in numerous other publications.



Betty is an Agent of Change, a Master Recycler and a former Recycling Information Specialist for Metro Regional Government in Portland, Oregon. For Metro, she was often featured on AM/Northwest, addressing Reducing, Reusing and Recycling. She has also been interviewed for KINK Radio's Talking Trash podcast, the Portland Sustainability Podcast and The Portland Cool Podcast. In addition, Betty is a quarterly contributor to The Green Living Journal.

A member of Northwest Earth Institute since 1994, Betty was honored with the NW Earth Institute Founders Award in 2013, recognizing her vast contributions to both Northwest Earth Institute and sustainability education and practice more broadly.

Member Meeting Minutes

October 7, 2024 7:00

This in-person meeting commenced at 7:03pm, with EGC President Nancy Haldeman presiding. There were 47 members present, and this was the first regular meeting since pausing for the summer break. The president began the meeting by introducing the current Board members and the 2024-25 committee chairs. Members were encouraged to join whatever committee sparks their interest, and to help spread the joy of gardening!

During the business portion of the meeting, a motion to approve the 2024-2025 EGC budget was brought and carried. A financial review for 2024 has been completed by EGC member Harriet Plumbley.

NPK (Neighborhood Planters Kiosk) - Kathleen Rochester presented a brief history of the NPK project, which began in 2016 and is currently a collaboration among Benton County Master Gardeners, City of Corvallis Parks and Recreation, Corvallis Sustainability Coalition, Corvallis EGC, and many other volunteers and kiosk hosts. EGC is responsible for contributing one article per month, which could be divided among willing EGC members. Nancy Sarpola and Heather Emberson added additional information, and member questions were answered. A volunteer coordinator from EGC is still needed to ensure timely dispersion of these articles to the numerous kiosk hosts.

<u>HNP</u> (Homegrown National Park) – Cathy Kerr spoke about how Doug Tallamy's book "Nature's Best Hope" prompted her and a friend to bring this important program to Corvallis. The current Demonstration Garden is located at 520 NW 4th St. in Corvallis. Signe Danler provided the landscape design for Phase I, which is currently under way. There are plans for 5 phases, which will include an edible garden. Cathy shared a detailed plan for this project and will post a link on the EGC website. She plans to provide EGC members an opportunity to purchase plants for this project.

<u>Fundraising Committee</u> – Cory Koos, Kathleen Rochester and Carrie Ottow presented upcoming fundraising activities including having a booth at the Benton County Gardeners "Insights into Gardening" event in February 2025. They plan to sell gloves, scoops, etc. Volunteers will be needed for this event. The Bottle Drop fundraiser is ongoing. Members use "blue bags" specifically earmarked for EGC to collect refundable bottles and cans, then bring them to a Bottle Drop location. Members may bring small amounts of their beverage recycling to meetings to contribute.

<u>Greens Party</u> – The Board previously voted to join Benton County Master Gardeners for the annual Greens Party in 2024. It will be held on Wednesday, December 4, 2024 at the Benton County Fairgrounds. Janet Magedanz has volunteered to chair this event. More information will be provided in the newsletter. Volunteers will be needed.

<u>Floral Therapy</u> – Floral Therapy is conducted weekly at various assisted living and memory care facilities to assist residents with floral projects. Volunteers are needed for this program and a weekly commitment is not required. Donna Westwood is chair of this committee.

<u>Book Sale</u> – Books which were donated by Friends of the Library will be for sale at each general meeting as an ongoing fundraiser for the Grants program.

A plant exchange was conducted and everyone came away with new plants!

The meeting was adjourned at 8:00pm

The next general meeting will be Monday, November 4, 2024 at Shepherd of the Valley Church. The speaker will be Betty Shelley, who will provide information on reducing waste to help our planet.
