# February Speaker Jo Wakelin

Jo Wakelin teaches horticulture at a college level and is very interested in the ecology of her local flora. Her garden was started in Central Otago, New Zealand in 2005 and contains many natives grown from seed she collected from her region. She also researched drought resistant plants from other parts of the world with a similar Mediterranean climate.

Using the philosophy that a garden needs to adapt to the conditions you have without additional water, she has created a stunning resilient dry garden. Her garden has been featured in the books 'Wild:The Naturalistic Garden' by Noel Kingsbury and in 'Visionary-Gardens and Landscapes for our Future' by Claire Takas with Giacomo Guzzon. Her garden was also the first New Zealand garden to grace the cover of Gardens Illustrated on its March 2024 cover.

#### Minutes of the January 06, 2025 General Meeting of the Corvallis Evening Garden Club

This ZOOM only meeting began at 7:00pm with EGC president Nancy Haldeman presiding. There were 38 EGC members in attendance.

Our program was presented by Linda Beutler, who serves as curator of the Rogerson Clematis Collection located near Lake Oswego, Oregon. Linda has written several books in which she shares her passion for Clematis. In addition, she lectures internationally on a variety of gardening topics.

Linda provided valuable information (and photographs) covering how Clematis efficiently climb, proper pruning techniques, and choosing appropriate companion plants for Clematis. Linda shared tips to successfully grow Clematis in containers, and explained how to choose the proper container, soil mix requirements, and offered several fertilizer options. EGC members had an opportunity to ask questions and we learned that Clematis occidentalis is a native; the best time to visit Rogerson Clematis Collection is late-June to early-July; and that there are many types of Clematis, each with varied attributes. The Rogerson Clematis Collection website contains extensive information about growing Clematis, visiting the garden, and available classes.

#### Slug Management & the Intersection of No-Till Soil Practices

Pest control can be tricky in the Willamette Valley especially in organic no-till systems. This presentation will teach slug identification, management practices, gastropods relationship to soil and what questions current research is asking at Oregon State University.
